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
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Gems of Wisdom from the Forebears of IIUM

ON GOOD CHARACTERS

Biography

Born on December 27th, 1917, Tan Sri Professor Dr. Muhammad Abdul Rauf served as the IIUM's first Rector from 1983 to 1988. He was an epitome of the IIUM, a towering yet humble scholarly figure of the budding garden that was soon to bloom into a "Garden of Knowledge and Virtue". A global academic and humanitarian, he strove to be the best that he could ever be and contributed as much as he ever could for humanity, bridging between the East and the West - in Malaysia, the Arab world, in the Western lands and in Africa - wherever he was, with mercy (Rahmah).

Muhammad Abdul Rauf, like the IIUM, the first international Islamic university of the contemporary world for which he served and represented as her first Rector, was truly beyond global. Comparable to the numerous devout Muslim scholars and intellectuals of earlier eras carrying the message of Rahmatan li'l-'Alamin (Mercy to all the Worlds) of the blessed Prophet Muhammad (s'aw), Muhammad Abdul Rauf was indeed universal (al-'alamin). He passed away on December 11th, 2004, at the age of 87. The excerpt above was written shortly before his passing. May Allah, by His Grace and Mercy, bless his soul and elevate him to be with the prophets (anbiyā'), sages (auliyā'), martyrs (shuhadā'), and those closest to Rabb al-'Alamin, The Lord of the Universe.






Know your University

History of the Emblem of the International Islamic University Malaysia

Sometime after the establishment of the IIUM in 1983, Professor Dr. Mohd Kamal Hassan mulled over the idea of an emblem for the young University. With his deft artistic hands, he combined his scholarly vision and mission of the University with his deep knowledge of the Qur'an and fond penchant for the Kufi Arabic calligraphy to come out with a draft. Upon the completion of the draft on January 16th, 1985, Professor Kamal brought the piece to the University authorities and deliberated his ideas contained within. It was then decided that a competition should be held, and the winning design would then be adopted as the University's emblem. Professor Kamal consigned an artist to reproduce the design and had the latter to partake in the competition. The artist won. The University then decided to simplify the design by taking only the centre emblem without the eight crescents.





Know your University

Two outstanding and very crucial elements of the original design need to be emphasised and brought to the fore. These are the two Qur'anic verses in light green calligraphy:

ٱقْرَأُ بِٱسْمِ رَبِّكَ ٱلَّذِي خَلَقَ 🗇

.Read! In the Name of your Lord and Cherisher, Who Created" (Q. al-'Alaq, 96:1)"

... إِنَّمَا يَخْشَى ٱللَّهَ مِنْ عِبَادِهِ ٱلْعُلَمَـٰؤُأْ...

"... Those truly fear Allah, among His Servants, [are those] who have knowledge..." (Q. Fātir, 35:28).

Together with their contexts, the two verses of the Qur'an became the cornerstones of the philosophy of the University. The pursuit of knowledge at the HUM through "readings" (Iqra') of the Signs of Allah (Ayat Allah) abundant in the Our'an and in the Open Book of Nature, must be for the sake of none other than to serve Allah The Most High, The Creator, The Owner, The Cherisher-Sustainer everything that exists, The Teacher and Giver of Knowledge, to gain His Pleasure.

Scholars ('ulama') of the different disciplines of knowledge and sciences, having mastered the secrets and intricacies of nature, must, by principle, be the most awed by Allah's Power and Dominion clearly seen in His Signs in nature, submitting humbly to The Creator of nature with utmost love (hubb) and ever fearful (khasyah) of causing His displeasure. The knowledge that one attains, must therefore rightly bring one closer to God, The One and Only Creator, in humility and gratitude, rather than the contrary, as warned in the following verses:

كُلَّا إِنَّ ٱلْإِنسَـٰنَ لَيَطْفَىٰ ۞ أَن رَّءَاهُ ٱسْتَغْنَىٰ ۞ إِنَّ إِلَىٰ رَبِّكَ ٱلرَّجْفَىٰ ۞ Nay, but man does transgress all bounds. In that he looks upon himself as" .self-sufficient. Surely to your Lord is your return" (Q. al-'Alaq, 96: 6-8)
