INCEST: A THREAT TO CHILDREN AND SELECTED SOLUTIONS

Introduction

The family institution has been long threatened by divorces¹ of marital couples with significant impact on the children of the family. Since children are the leader of the future, they therefore need protection, love and care. Divorces do not help in shaping the leaders of the future. Divorces, are however better than child abuse² and incest.³

The occurrence of incest in Malaysia is alarming and the statistics from the Royal Malaysian Police Force shows that incest cases are high and they institute almost 20% of the total rape cases in peninsular Malaysia.
