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Chapter 7

Hadith as a Source of Islamic Da'wah

Introduction

The position that *hadith* of Rasulullah (pbuh) occupies in Islam is very significant. It is important because it is a complementary note to the Qur'an. It is regarded complementary because it offers a greed deal of information covering socio-cultural, political, religious and economic matters. Apart from the afore-mentioned matters, inviting people to the path or monotheistic concept of Allah was the primary responsibility of all the prophets and messengers. Subsequently, the scholars inherited from the prophets, the conveyance of Allah's message to the populace. This is why the prophet (pbuh) him, says; "The scholars are heirs of the prophets." Hadith as a Source of Da'wah Content
