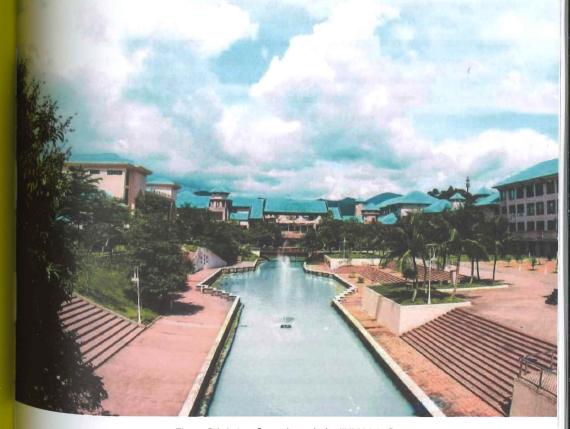


Figure 8.1: A river flows through the IIUM Main Campus.

River of Life Project from Maqāṣid al-Sharī'ah and SDGs perspectives

The river of life project is well aligned with *maqāṣid al-sharī'ah*. Allāh (SWT) blessed this universe with the wonderful grace of balance and equilibrium. For instance, the earth was created in a state of natural equilibrium so that man may discover some of its forms and express them as laws of nature. The synergy and symbiosis in nature happen both at microscopic and macroscopic levels. Both are intricate as well as breathtakingly astounding. Carbon dioxide, for example, is generated through several natural processes, including respiration, in which oxygen is consumed. At the same time, trees consume large amounts of carbon dioxide via daylight photosynthesis to produce oxygen. In this way, the amounts of carbon dioxide and oxygen are kept at an optimal balance to sustain life on earth. On the contrary, since the era of the first industrial revolution, the pace of industrial activities has been on the rise. Industrial effluents and motor vehicles have negatively affected the environmental balance, and in turn led to what is known today as climate change, where global warming being one of its most ruinous episodes.

Rivers are one of the most important natural sources of water. In their natural condition, they are able to sustain balance and equilibrium through selfneutralisation. However, rivers are also not spared from pollution. Assuming that bodies of running water are capable of self-counterbalance as they have been performing in their natural healthy state, there have been continuous dumping of industrial wastes, sewage discharges and garbage in rivers due to human negligence and greed. However, loading rivers with pollution beyond their capacity led to an imbalance in their state of equilibrium. Rivers receive more than they can equalize. They have become heavily polluted to alarmingly dangerous levels. In addition, illegal loggings, deforestations, clear cutting of lands and levelling of hills for developments result in heavy silting of rivers and lakes. Apart from causing floods affecting life on land, heavy silting affects the quality of fresh water, which in turn affects the quality of life under water. The Qur'an describes human mishandling of natural resources that lead to environmental pollution in general, and the pollution of rivers, in particular, as acts of corruption (fasād). The Qur'ān (30:41) states: "Corruption has appeared throughout the land and sea by [reason of] what the hands of people have earned." From an Islamic perspective, irresponsible human behaviour towards the environment contradicts the principles of maqāṣid al-sharī'ah, which aims to achieve the five elements of preservations: religion (al-dīn), life (al-nafs), mind (al-'aql), offspring (al-nasl) and wealth (al-māl). As water is one of

Allāh (SWT)'s great blessings on man, preservation of rivers is considered as a fulfilment of the principles of maqāṣid al-sharī'ah.

Rivers are one of the main sources of water. Civilizations were established by river banks as life cannot be sustained without water. Islam emphasises the preservation of water in general. Water is mentioned in the Qur'ān in relation to life, humans, animals and plants. The water cycle is often described in detail in the Qur'ān. The various sources of water (rivers, springs, rain, through rocks, etc.) and the means of keeping it (in rocks and underground reservoirs) are also highlighted. According to Islam, water is the basis of life on earth. The Qur'ān (21:30) declares, "And we made of water everything alive." Water is considered a national property; no single person or entity can control it and deprive people of having their supply of water. In a narration, the Prophet (SAW) reportedly emphasised the partnership of people in three things: water, pastures and fire.

Pastures refer to crops in general and fire could refer to energy in our contemporary terminology. Based on this, Islam prohibits the act of wasting water. It is reported in Sunan Ibn Majah that Prophet Mohammed (SAW) saw one of his companions taking ablution preparing for prayers. The Prophet told him not to be wasteful in the use of water. The man then asked him, is there wastage in using water? The prophet replied, "Do not waste water even if you were at a running stream" (Al-Qazwini, 2007: 425).

This is a clear indication of how much emphasis Islam lays on the conservation of water. Polluting rivers results in negatively affecting one of the most important water resources, which goes against *maqāṣid al-sharī'ah*. Polluted rivers affect life and resources (wealth), which may as well affect the healthy functioning of the intellect and the health of generations of life (progeny). There is no doubt that contaminated rivers pose a threat to one of the most important national resources and could put a nation on the risk of facing shortage of water. It also poses as a health hazard resulting in illnesses and diseases for humans and animals, and the quality of plants. Once pollutants enter food chains, the negative effects are widespread, affecting generations.

Allāh (SWT) has made nature subservient to humans who are the *khulafāhs* (vicegerents) on earth. This helps humans to carry out their vicegerency. They may harness natural resources including water and rivers in manners that
